Our Garden Club of Ohio (GCO) President Kathy Wagner has "Let's Garden with Ohio Natives" as her president's project so I thought I would spotlight a native plant each month. So to start, I will begin with a ground cover plant **Golden Ragwort** (Packera aurea hardiness zone 3-8). This plant is very hardy, has yellow daisy-like flowers in April-May, and a carpet of rounded semi-evergreen scalloped leaves that make this plant hard-working in a sunny or partly shaded spot. Height: .50 to2.50 feet. Benefit to bees and butterflies. It does spread but is easy to manage. I deadhead it once it's done blooming to reduce self -seeding. I have planted this in difficult areas that I want to cover the ground to prevent; reduce weeds and it does its job. Additionally this plant was a pass along plant to me from a past member, Pat Keltner. I would be happy to pass along some to you!

2024 Plant Sale request

Please save any plastic pots you have acquired over the summer. The pots you bought mums for your fall displays are a good size so please save them when you toss the plants. Hanging baskets too, without the hanger.

Horticulture - Pat Cotsman

Look at your winter landscape and determine if there is something you can add to make it more interesting. There are evergreens in different colors and textures. There are trees with interesting or colored bark. Something like Harry Lauder's walking stick with its twisty contorted branches looks great against a fence or light colored wall. Plus you will be really popular with arrangers who prize those branches. There is a purple leaf variety that makes it more interesting when in leaf.

Look through Garden Magazines (the library has some nice ones) to see what's new for the coming year. One I saw that interested me was a Hydrangea with purple leaves. I love to pair purple leafed plants with chartreuse leafed cultivars. If you feed the birds be sure to put out water when the temps go below 32 degrees. Birds will eat snow but it saps body heat and they may not do well when night temps are cold. I use a plastic plant saucer (large) with a water heater on a table on my deck. I can watch the birds come to drink. If you buy a birdbath heater make sure it is thermostatic and turns on when temp. of water falls below 35. You don't want to waste electricity by having it on all the time. Plug it into a ground fault detector plug. I use the plug I use in the summer to run my fountain in my small pool off the deck.

If you use salt on icy sidewalks, see where the runoff goes. Salt is damaging to certain trees and shrubs. Junipers tolerate it well but pines don't. If you have pines that get sprayed by salty water when cars drive on the street, put up burlap to protect their needles from the spray. Otherwise they can turn orange and the trees may die. You may want to consider switching to calcium chloride for your walks as it is less damaging to plants. Sand will work
