You can gauge humidity by looking at a pine cone. Pine cones exist to keep the seed dry and protected. When the weather is drier the pine cone will open up for the seeds to disperse. When there is high humidity the cones close to keep out moisture.

The Coulter pine cone is the heaviest in the world. They can weigh up to 10 pounds or more.

Holiday Plants and Pet Safety

Holidays mean holiday decorations for most. Keep your furry companions safe this season by placing potentially harmful plants out of their reach. Below are a few popular choices that need special consideration.

Lilies are highly toxic for cats, all parts including pollen and water dish. If ingested they can cause life threatening kidney damage.

Amaryllis is toxic to both cats and dogs. In dogs eating the actually bulb can cause intestinal obstruction as well.


Yew is highly toxic to both cat and dogs.

Holly and Mistletoe are poisonous to cats and dogs. Christmas tree water can contain bacteria, pesticides and mold.

Poinsettia has gotten a bad reputation but is only mildly toxic, potentially causing some stomach or skin irritation. It is still best kept out of reach.

There are many others so it's always best to check. A good source is the ASPCA's Poisonous Plant List on their website

Plant History

The pointsettia flower is native to southern Mexico. The plants were used by the ancient Aztecs to make a purple dye for clothing and cosmetics. The milky sap wax was used as a medicinal component to treat fevers.

Pointsettias get their American name from Joel Roberts Pointsett, the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, who brought them to the states in the early 1800s. They did not become a staple in holiday decor until nearly a century later when promoted by the entrepreneurial Ecke family.

Visitors to the Cleveland Botanical Garden "Frost" holiday festival will find the answer in

On November 17th, the decorating group lined up the characters in the story that baby bird questions as it makes its way up the tree to the nest it fell out of — to find its mother waiting for it complete with a worm for dinner. A ribbon with bird tracks winds around the tree leading to each character baby bird questions. "Are you my mother?" and other quotes from the book are framed in red. Dried hydrangeas, painted alliums, dried sedum blossoms, ornaments with queen Anne's lace "snowflakes," and mushrooms made from acorn caps provided filler. The

The tracking ribbon was hand-printed by Fran; Rosanne created the framed text disks that lead baby bird (and viewers) to follow it up the tree to the nest with mother bird. Thanks to everyone involved in this project, this tree is one of the best we have created and will surely be a favorite of visitors to the Garden in 2024!
