Horticulture - Pat Cotsman

If you feed the birds or enjoy seeing them in your yard, a fresh water source helps them survive the cold winter temperatures. I used a birdbath heater that is thermostatic. That means it turns on at 35 degrees (water temp.) and off above that. Mine resembles a gray rock and I place it in a large plastic plant saucer on a table on my deck. It is plugged into the GFI outlet I use for my pool fountain in warm weather. Lately I have seen over a dozen birds at a time visiting it.

I don't like snow but it is beneficial to plants as it keeps the soil warmer when temperatures approach zero. If you are planning on adding native plants or shrubs to your garden, do some research to see what they need. Most natives do not need additional fertilizer or water (once established). Putting these in rich soil will result in rampant growth that will sprawl. There are natives adapted to wet sites, shady sites, dry sunny areas and clay soil. Try to match your site with the plant. Natives are generally resistant to browsing by deer, rabbits and other critters. They benefit the pollinators by providing nectar. They can be hosts for butterfly larvae. Some are hosts to moth caterpillars which provide food for nesting birds. We help the ecosystem by growing these plants instead of hybrids that may or not make pollen, nectar or seeds. I have always found it fun to try something I never grew before. Sometimes it's veggies and sometimes flowers. There have been winners and losers over the years but it's always fun. This year was Schizanthus and 2025 will be Godetia (both annual flowers).

Plant History

In Greek Mythology Snowdrops are a symbol of hope and rebirth. They are said to emerge from the ground as a promise of Persephone's imminent return and the arrival of spring.

The first recorded cultivation of Snowdrops in England was in the 16th century. They were popularized by the Victorian's language of flowers; in which they mean hope.

While not native to Ohio, they are not considered invasive and are a great early food source for pollinators.





The story is based on a real-life event. A baby owl was shipped from Connecticut to Rockefeller Center in the live Christmas tree to be installed there. It was nearly dead when discovered, and was transferred to a raptor rehab center for recovery. It survived and was ultimately released back into its native location.
