### **Plant History**

Cardinal flower was introduced to Europe in the mid 1620s. It earned its common name from the similarity to the bright red vestments of the Roman Catholic Cardinals.

Native Americans used it primarily for medicinal purposes. Some tribes incorporated them into ceremonial use or love charms.

They are great attractors for hummingbirds, which are their primary pollinators.

### **Horticulture - Pat Cotsman**

When the snow and cold weather go away (can't be soon enough for me) check your perennials for frost heaving. This happens when the soil is wet and day temps are above freezing but night temps below 32 degrees. Ice crystals form in the top layer of soil and your plants can be pushed or heaved out of the soil. Fall planted ones are susceptible as they may not have put down anchoring roots. It also happens to shallow rooted specimens. I've noticed it happens to my Heucheras. If you see this has happened, try to gently push the plant back into your soil or cover its roots with more soil so the roots don't dry out and die.

You can cut branches of Spring flowering shrubs and trees now and bring them inside to force the bloom. Pussy Willows and Forsythia work well for this. Others to try are Flowering Crabs, Quince, Magnolia, Redbud and fruit trees. You can use branches you would prune off anyway such as crossing branches and ones too crowded. Cut them when the temp is above 32, recut the stem inside at a steep angle and put in warm water. They don't need sunlight, just a warm spot. When the buds start to open, arrange in a vase and enjoy a bit of Spring.

If you didn't clean up your perennial beds in the Fall, now is the time to do it. If you have ornamental grasses, it's best to remove the dead leaves before new ones start growing. You can scatter compost or fertilizer on your perennial beds now. Just remember natives and some cultivars do best in lean soil. They overgrow with too much Nitrogen and sprawl all over. Take note of any plants that need dividing or have self seeded. You can donate these to friends or our plant sale.
